**WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, 2022**

The Committee on Energy and Commerce met, pursuant to notice, at 10:18 a.m., a quorum being present, for a hybrid markup in the John D. Dingell Room, 2123 of the Rayburn House Office Building, and remotely via the Committee's Webex platform, Hon. Frank Pallone, Jr. (Chairman of the committee) presiding. The business before the Committee was consideration and markup of 24 bills pending before the full Committee. The following actions were taken:

1. [H.R. 3655](#), the "Vaccine Injury Compensation Modernization Act of 2021," was ordered reported favorably to the House, **as amended by the Subcommittee on Health**, by a voice vote (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H.R. 3655.

2. [H.R. 5141](#), the "Maximizing Outcomes through Better Investments in Lifesaving Equipment for (MOBILE) Health Care Act," was ordered reported favorably to the House, **as amended by the Subcommittee on Health**, by a roll call vote of 52 yeas to 0 nays ([Roll call no. 139](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H.R. 5141.

3. [H.R. 8163](#), the "Improving Trauma Systems and Emergency Care Act," was ordered reported favorably to the House, **amended**, by a roll call vote of 55 yeas to 1 nays ([Roll call no. 140](#)) (**Final Passage**).

The following amendments were offered during consideration of H.R. 8163:

- **An Amendment in the Nature of a Substitute (AINS) #1** ([H8163-FCD-AINS\\_01](#)), offered by Mr. O'Halleran, was agreed to by a voice vote.

4. [H.R. 6737](#), the "Flint Registry Reauthorization Act," was ordered reported favorably to the House, **as amended by the Subcommittee on Health**, by a roll call vote of 34 yeas to 22 nays ([Roll call no. 141](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H.R. 6737.

5. [H.R. 6965](#), the “Visit America Act,” ordered reported favorably to the House, **amended**, by a roll call vote of 56 yeas to 0 nays ([Roll call no. 142](#)) (**Final Passage**).

The following amendments were offered during consideration of H.R. 6965:

- **An Amendment in the Nature of a Substitute (AINS) #1** ([H6965\\_ANS\\_01](#)), offered by Mr. Soto, was agreed to by a voice vote.

6. [H.R. 5441](#), the “Prevent All Soring Tactics Act of 2021” or the “PAST Act of 2021,” was ordered reported favorably to the House, **amended**, by a roll call vote of 46 yeas to 9 nays ([Roll call no. 143](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H.R. 5441.

7. [H. Res. 1355](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President and directing the Secretary of Health and Human Services to transmit, respectively, certain documents to the House of Representatives relating to ivermectin, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 32 yeas to 21 nays ([Roll call no. 144](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1355.

8. [H. Res. 1244](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President and directing the Secretary of Health and Human Services to transmit, respectively, certain documents to the House of Representatives relating to any COVID-19 vaccine, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 32 yeas to 22 nays ([Roll call no. 145](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1244.

9. [H. Res. 1258](#), a resolution of inquiry directing the Secretary of Health and Human Services to provide certain documentation to the House of Representatives relating to the calculation of certain expenditure limitations applicable to Federal funding of the Medicaid program in Puerto Rico, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 32 yeas to 22 nays ([Roll call no. 146](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1258.

10. [H. Res. 1263](#), a resolution of inquiry directing the President to provide certain documents in the President's possession to the House of Representatives relating to COVID-19 funding, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 30 yeas to 24 nays ([Roll call no. 147](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1263.

11. [H. Res. 1267](#), a resolution of inquiry directing the President to provide certain documents in the President's possession to the House of Representatives relating to the oversight of the Wuhan Institute of Virology laboratory by the Director of the National Institutes of Health, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 32 yeas to 23 nays ([Roll call no. 148](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1267.

12. [H. Res. 1268](#), a resolution of inquiry directing the President to provide certain documents in the President's possession to the House of Representatives relating to actions taken by the Secretary of Health and Human Services related to the COVID-19 pandemic response, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 31 yeas to 23 nays ([Roll call no. 149](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1268.

13. [H. Res. 1274](#), a resolution of inquiry directing the President to provide certain documents in the President's possession to the House of Representatives relating to communications by or among any of the Department of Health and Human Services, the Office of National Drug Control Policy, the White House, the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the Department of Justice related to the executive branch's recommendations for a long-term, consensus approach to reduce the supply and availability of illicitly manufactured fentanyl-related substances in the United States, was ordered reported *without recommendation* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 32 yeas to 22 nays ([Roll call no. 150](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1274.

14. [H. Res. 1275](#), a resolution of inquiry directing the President to provide certain documents in the President's possession to the House of Representatives relating to communications by staff of the White House regarding the implications of revoking the public health orders commonly referred to as "title 42", was ordered reported *without recommendation* to the

House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 32 yeas to 23 nays ([Roll call no. 151](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1275.

15. [H. Res. 1284](#), a resolution of inquiry directing the Secretary of Health and Human Services to provide certain documentation to the House of Representatives relating to the negotiation of prices for prescription drugs under the Medicare prescription drug program, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 31 yeas to 22 nays ([Roll call no. 152](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1284.

16. [H. Res. 1287](#), a resolution of inquiry directing the President to provide certain documents in the President's possession to the House of Representatives relating to the recall of infant formula manufactured by Abbott Laboratories and potential impacts on the infant formula supply chain, was ordered reported *favorably* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 56 yeas to 0 nays ([Roll call no. 153](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1287.

17. [H. Res. 1265](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President to provide certain documents to the House of Representatives relating to plans to exploit the energy crisis to pursue a radical climate agenda, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 31 yeas to 22 nays ([Roll call no. 154](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1265.

18. [H. Res. 1272](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President to provide certain documents to the House of Representatives relating to plans to declare a “climate emergency” in order to invoke emergency authorities to impose regulations on industrial activity, or the supply and delivery of energy or electric power, in the United States, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 31 yeas to 21 nays ([Roll call no. 155](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1272.

19. [H. Res. 1260](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President, and directing the Secretary of Energy, to transmit to the House of Representatives certain information relating to plans to draw down and sell petroleum products from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve and plans to refill the Strategic Petroleum Reserve, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House,

**without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 31 yeas to 20 nays ([Roll call no. 156](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1260.

20. [H. Res. 1326](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President, and directing the Secretary of Energy, to transmit to the House of Representatives certain information relating to plans to protect baseload bulk power system generation and transmission to maintain bulk power system reliability, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 30 yeas to 20 nays ([Roll call no. 157](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1326.

21. [H. Res. 1264](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President to transmit to the House of Representatives certain documents relating to misinformation and the preservation of free speech, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 30 yeas to 19 nays ([Roll call no. 158](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1264.

22. [H. Res. 1271](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President transmit to the House of Representatives certain documents relating to activities of the National Telecommunications and Information Administration relating to broadband service, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 30 yeas to 19 nays ([Roll call no. 159](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1271.

23. [H. Res. 1237](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President to provide certain documents to the House of Representatives relating to online censorship of political speech, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 30 yeas to 18 nays ([Roll call no. 160](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1237.

24. [H. Res. 1261](#), a resolution of inquiry requesting the President to provide certain documents to the House of Representatives relating to communications and directives with the Federal Trade Commission, was ordered reported *adversely* to the House, **without amendment**, by a roll call vote of 30 yeas to 18 nays ([Roll call no. 161](#)) (**Final Passage**).

No amendments were offered during consideration of H. Res. 1261.
