Specifically, I am troubled by a recent report by the Government Accountability Office (GAO) showing that federal investigators were able to purchase potentially dangerous counterfeit products through popular online platforms. Counterfeit products, such as fake cosmetics and electronics, can cause serious harm to consumers and endanger public health.

The Energy and Commerce Committee has a longstanding interest in protecting consumers from harmful products – especially products such as cosmetics that consumers may be using every day. Regarding cosmetics in particular, my office has worked to strengthen safety standards and draw attention to potentially harmful cosmetics and personal care products.<sup>1</sup>
