Mr. President:

As Ranking Members of the committees with jurisdiction over health care, we write to request copies of the most-favored-nation agreements that you struck with pharmaceutical companies and have kept hidden from Congress and the American people. While there is no evidence that you have meaningfully reduced health care costs for Americans—and substantial evidence that your policies have increased those costs—you continue to boast about these deals as the solution to Americans’ prescription drug costs. For example, you have repeatedly claimed that you have lowered drug costs by absurd numbers like “1,500 percent,” which would actually mean that drug companies would be *paying* patients.¹ Needless to say, this is not happening, and a reality-based discussion about your secret deals with drug companies is overdue.

In your State of the Union address, you discussed these agreements with pharmaceutical companies and your TrumpRx website, and declared that you were “calling on Congress to codify my most favored nation program into law.”² Additionally, in response to a report issued by House Energy and Commerce Committee Democratic Staff demonstrating that many drugs on TrumpRx do not actually save Americans money, your Deputy Press Secretary, Kush Desai, said that “Democrats should spend their time working with Republicans to . . . codify the President’s drug pricing deals for every American.”³

However, essential information has not been provided to Congress. In this case, the deals that you are asking Congress to codify into federal law have not been made available. To make matters worse, the agreements that pharmaceutical companies signed under your threat of tariffs—which would only have further raised drug prices for Americans—contain provisions that bar the disclosure of the agreements or information about the agreements’ terms. In other words, not only have you failed to provide Congress with necessary information, but you have also prohibited the companies from doing so themselves.

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If you truly believe that the deals you struck are in the best interest of the American people and should be codified by Congress, you will promptly provide them to Congress without limitation or redaction. Then, and only then, can there be any discussion or debate about whether they accomplish the goal that Democrats have long championed of lowering prescription drug prices for Americans. If you do not provide the agreements, however, the only conclusion that we can reach is that they serve the interests of you and the pharmaceutical industry rather than the American people.

Please provide Congress with complete and unredacted copies of the most-favored-nation deals immediately.
